

Table 4. Re-constructions of full-scale later prehistoric houses

This list aims to include all full-scale re-constructions of what are stated to be Bronze Age and Iron Age roundhouses. Re-constructions that are not full scale have been excluded wherever possible. The information is derived from: (1) a list of EXARC 'venues' which is no longer exists on the Internet (<http://openarchaeology.info>), (2) a list at http://commons.wikimedia.org/wiki/Category:Reconstructions_of_Iron_Age_roundhouses_in_the_United_Kingdom; and (3) another list of roundhouses at <http://www.britishroundhouses.com/england.html>>. Searches were also undertaken for 'Iron Age', 'reconstructed' and 'roundhouse' and 'Celtic', 'reconstructed' and 'roundhouse' on Google (July 2017, updated September 2023, and last updated in August 2024). A few re-constructions have also been identified from information provided by colleagues. Re-constructed roundhouses were excluded when they appear not to have been full scale and where only a photograph or limited information could be found on the Internet. This information was assembled by Richard Hingley for the 'Ancient Identities' project.
